A Reading from Jeremiah 22:15a-16 & 29:7

Is this not what it means to know me?" declares the Lord", "Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare."

A Reading from Luke 3:11

Peruvian theologian and priest, Gustavo Gutierrez, made a scathing distinction between transactional and relational acts of charity when he asked, "You say you care about the poor? Then tell me, what are their names?" Jesus didn't say that his followers would know *of* the poor, but rather that we would actually *know* them, indicating that when we genuinely love them, we'll stop calling them "the poor" and start calling them by their names.
